Lockdown recipes

Custard Tart

Blind bake Pastry case

- Use a 23cm loose bottom tart tin if possible, line with pastry, pricking the bottom with a fork
- Put parchment paper inside, then the baking beans and bake at 190c remove the beans and leave out for 10 mins.
- Put back in the oven for 5mins, then brush with a beaten egg and return to oven for a few mins.
- Leave to cool and cut off excess pastry.

Ingredients

3 med eggs

3 med egg yolks

75g white caster sugar

500ml double/whipping cream

2/3 tsps vanilla extract

2 whole nutmegs grated or to taste

Method

- Pre heat oven to 130c fan
- Pour the cream into a small saucepan, add the vanilla extract and bring to the boil.
- Add eggs, yolks and sugar in a bowl and mix together.
- Add the boiling cream into the egg mixture and whisk together.
- Sieve it back into the jug, then put the pastry case in the oven and pour in the mixture just below the top.
- Grate the nutmeg on to the top of the tart.



- Bake for about 25 mins, depending on your oven—you should have a slight wobble in the centre.
- Leave on a cooling rack until cold and then chill in a fridge for a few hours.

I can recommend this custard tart—it's delicious!

My dear Nephew Darren

When producing material for your magazine or church services, beware the computer spell-checker. We once let our own system check a Christmas carol sheet and, on the night, found ourselves obliged to sing “away in a manager”, mangers apparently being unknown to our machine.

If you use special sheets regularly, it seems a law of nature – as with metal coat hangers – that they all intermingle while no one is watching. Thus, on Easter Day, half the congregation will have been issued with sheets for Harvest, which will only become obvious once the service begins. The first hymn will be entirely lost while sides-men scuttle about looking for replacements only to find that there won’t be enough of them anyway and then the second hymn will be lost while others helpfully wander about church donating their sheets to those looking helpless and then trying to find someone to share with. Never, ever, print on them ‘Do not take home’ as this will only ensure everyone does so. Word For Today

Recall God's loving kindness to you

'Your loving kindness is before my eyes.'

Psalm 26:3

The story's told of a little boy who was asked, 'Do you say your prayers every night?' He replied, 'No, some nights I don't need anything!' We smile, but the point is painfully obvious: if the only time your partner communicated with you was when they were in trouble or had a need they couldn't meet, how long do you think your relationship would last?

There must be a balance between your praises and your petitions. You say, 'If the Lord is big enough to create and run a universe, I doubt He's bothered when somebody as insignificant as me fails to say thanks.' Not so! When Jesus healed ten lepers and only one returned to give thanks, He asked, '*Where are the other nine?*' (*Luke 17:17 NIV*). If God dealt with you solely on the basis of His righteousness and your proclivity for unrighteousness, you'd be sunk! But He doesn't. He says, '*I have loved you...with an everlasting love. With unfailing love I have drawn you to myself*' (*Jeremiah 31:3 NLT*).

Realising this, the psalmist wrote, '*Because Your loving kindness is better than life, my lips shall praise You. Thus I will bless You while I live*' (*Psalm 63:3-4 NKJV*). Again he writes: '*I will...praise Your name for your lovingkindness and Your truth; for You have magnified Your Word above all Your name. In the day when I cried out, You answered me and made me bold with strength in my soul*' (*Psalm 138:2-3 NKJV*)

Someone quipped, 'God doesn't mind getting invoiced as long as He gets thanked! So, take a moment to recall Gods lovingkindness to you today and every day.

St Mary Magdalene, the woman with a past

It is easy to understand the popularity of Mary Magdalene over the centuries: she is the patron saint both of repentant sinners and of the contemplative life. Jesus drove seven demons from Mary, who came from near Tiberius in Galilee. Mary has also sometimes been identified with the woman who anointed Christ's feet in the house of Simon.



She became His follower to the bitter end. She followed Him to Jerusalem and was present during the crucifixion, standing heart-broken at the foot of the cross. Her love for Jesus did not end there, for she went to the tomb to anoint His body on the Sunday morning. Such faithful, humble devotion was richly repaid; it gave her a unique privilege among all mankind: she was the first person to whom the Risen Lord appeared on Easter Sunday morning. She thought He was the gardener at first.

Jesus told Mary to go to His disciples and tell them about His return to Heaven. She was obedient and became the first emissary of the resurrection. In those days, the witness of a woman was worthless. Despite ridicule, Mary had the courage to speak about Jesus in a place of great disbelief.



David promised, and Saul and his army went home.



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
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
